





Scurfield Hall has been the home of the Haskayne School of Business since 1986.

When the building first opened, the school had approximately 1,000 students who attended classes in traditional lecture halls. Our numbers and our teaching methods have changed significantly since then.

Today, too many of Haskayne's 4,000 students need to attend classes in other parts of campus because the facilities in Scurfield Hall are full. This is a critical time for the school to expand in support of our strategic growth and bold vision.

The Haskayne Capital Expansion Project will enable the construction of a second building, Mathison Hall, and enhancements to our existing space. When Mathison Hall opens its doors in late 2022, a new era will begin for the Haskayne School of Business. Together, we will:

- Add significant capacity for teaching and learning, research and community engagement with a cohesive and dynamic new environment.
- Create a home for our students by bringing all business classes back to the business school with new places to collaborate, study and learn.
- Build a student-centered learning environment that will combine classrooms with innovative technology functional and collaborative study spaces and meeting rooms, student advising and career services into one beautiful space.
- Support the growth of our MBA, Master of Management, Doctor of Business Administration and BComm programs with state-of-the-art facilities, high level resources and services.
- Welcome the community on campus to connect and convene at special events, to learn from thought leaders and renowned speakers, and to enrich our student experience.

In May 2018, the university committed \$50 million towards our \$90-million capital expansion project. In June 2018, Calgary business leader and philanthropist Ronald P. Mathison made a \$20 million gift to Energize: The Campaign for Eyes High, UCalgary's \$1.3 billion fundraising campaign, spearheading the philanthropic funding for this ambitious project. In his honour, the new building will be named Mathison Hall.

Other philanthropic leaders in our community have also stepped up to invest in the project, including Rob Peters and family, Michael and Renae Tims, as well as Mac and Susan Van Wielingen, through Viewpoint Foundation.

We are now seeking additional philanthropic investments to complete the new building and enhance the existing Scurfield Hall. These new facilities will be a state-of-the-art home for the Haskayne School of Business — not just for today, but for generations of bold leaders to come.




Collaboration spaces




